# Electives

Electives are unexamined, five-week courses that pupils choose to attend, with an optional independent project offered at the conclusion of some courses. Electives offer pupils the opportunity to explore areas of study beyond their Sixth Form subjects, broadening engagement and developing their academic curiosity. Pupils may opt to attend courses which complement with their A level and vocational subject options, or contrast with them.

Electives play an integral part in the Worksop College Diploma, which is earned by pupils participating in, and engaging with, a variety of super-curricular activities. Pupils earn credits for each super-curricular activity they engage with, with the number of credits based on duration and challenge of the activity. Lower Sixth pupils are expected to engage with at least one Elective every two series and Upper Sixth pupils are expected to engage in one Elective throughout the year, with 30 credits earned after a full attendance to an Elective. Four Elective Series run each year.

The Four Elective series for the 25/26 academic year are:

- First series of Electives: Mon 15th Sep - Fri 18th Oct
- Second series of Electives: Mon 3rd Nov - Friday 5th Dec
- Third series of Electives: Mon 12th Jan - Friday 13th Feb
- Fourth series of Electives: Mon 23rd Feb - Fri 27th March

The Worksop College Diploma cannot be earned without completion of at least four Electives over the two years of their Sixth Form study.

Lead Member of Staff: Mr Breheney


This course would take students through knowledge of ultrasound techniques, x-rays, CT scans and more.
